### Finding Books

Begin your research by locating books with general information about your topic. Check the library's catalog to find books.

#### How to Do a Basic Search

Big Tip
Write down

Write down words that show up again and again during your research! Visit the Library Web site at <a href="http://www.ptc.edu/library">http://www.ptc.edu/library</a> and click on the **Library Catalog** link. Begin your search on the **Basic Search** page. Here, you can do different types of searches and access all types of information.

- 1. To begin, type a term in the search box.
- To narrow a search, select one of the following options before clicking the **Search** button:
  - Keyword (word or phrase)
  - Author
  - Title
  - Subject
  - Series
  - Periodical title
- Select a library to search in the Library box, or select Piedmont Technical College Libraries to include all branches in the search.
- Select PTC Libraries and E\_RESOURCES to search for electronic books in addition to print books.

Remember to write down the whole call number!

## Don't Forget E-Books!

The Library offers 30,000+ full-text electronic books that are completely searchable and accessible from home! To use e-books, **visit** <a href="http://www.ptc.edu/library/ebooks.htm">http://www.ptc.edu/library/ebooks.htm</a>. If working from home, you will need to enter a password which is available from PTC Pathway (Library tab) or from staff of the Library or County Center LRCs.

# **Health-Related Databases**

Visit http://www.ptc.edu/library to access 49 article databases, including many that are related to materials as well as full-text artihealth topics. Many articles that you find will be full-text.

Academic Search Premiere. More health articles than any other PTC database.

CINAHL. Covers 1,700+ nursing and health journals and publications.

Clinical Pharmacology. Covers prescription drugs, herbal and nutritional supplements, OTC products, new and trial drugs.

Health Reference Center Academic. Scholarly articles on a wide range of health topics.

Health Source: Nursing/ Academic Edition. Full text access to 550+ scholarly journals and abstracts from 800+ titles.

**Health & Wellness Resource** Center. Offers current reference cles and pamphlets from respected medical sources.

Lexis-Nexis Academic. Full-text news, business, legal, medical, and reference information.

Liebert Online. Electronic access to peer-reviewed journals in the fields of biotechnology, biomedical research/life sciences. clinical medicine and surgery, and law. Includes 28,000+ papers from more than 55 authoritative journals, all full-text searchable and linked to external bibliographic databases.

Medline. References biomedical lit including research, clinical practice, administration, policy issues, and healthcare services. Offers article citations from 4,600 U.S. and international journals.

# **Evaluating Web Resources**

A recent Consumer Reports article states that up to 90% of online health information may be incomplete or inaccurate. Source: "Expertise online: finding reliable information." Consumer Reports. September 2005, p. 48.

Before using a source, consider each of the following:

- Does the Web address indicate that the site is commercial (.com), government (.gov), educational (.edu), or other?
- Have you heard of the people who offer this site?
- Are you expected to do, believe, or buy something?
- Is the Web site current?
- Is the information professionally presented?
- Does the provider acknowledge his sources?

If you are still in doubt after considering each of these points, then find other reputable sources that back up what the site is saying.
