





Scholarship application reminders are posted in the Student Success Center, in the Campus Connection, via Pathway, and posted on bulletin boards. It is the student's responsibility to apply online in enough time for the faculty to complete the online recommendation by the last date specified.

SCHOLARSHIP INFO/PROCESS

- Webpage: http://www.ptc.edu/cost-financial-aid/types-aid/scholarships
- When applying, check for spelling, grammatical errors, and professional presentation. Do not type in all "all caps" or in all lowercase. Have your Pathway/DegreeWorks account open in order to provide your current and cumulative (overall) GPA.

REQUIREMENTS AND CRITERIA:

CREDIT HOURS: Twelve (12) required credit hours completed for your program not including transfer credits or 100 level or lower courses.

RECOMMENDATION PROCESS: Inform a faculty member who has taught you in a previously completed class in your major that are applying for a scholarship and that you would like that person to complete your recommendation. If the faculty member agrees, simply list that person's name on your online scholarship application. Staff counselors are not instructors unless he/she taught you in an academic class. Once you list the faculty member's name on your application, that person will receive instructions to submit the online recommendation. Apply early so that the faculty can do the recommendation before the deadline so that you may be considered for a scholarship.

<u>TIMEFRAME</u> -You must not have received a foundation scholarship within the last 12 months.

<u>GPA</u> – Cumulative (overall) GPA of 2.5 or higher is required. <u>CRITERIA CATEGORIES</u>: Academic success, major, financial need, leadership activity, campus/community involvement, and residency.

FUNDING:

-All funds awarded can be applied ONLY to tuition, books, and required educational supplies/tools/purchased at/through Piedmont Tech.
-Students who receive a program-specific scholarship may lose the unused portion of the award if the major/degree is changed.

-In instances where a student has to withdraw from the college, remaining funds of the student's scholarship will be held for one year. Scholarship recipients must use the funds awarded within a two year period.

-If a student graduates from the college with unused portions of a scholarship, those funds will be returned to the Foundation Office, unless

scholarship, those funds will be returned to the Foundation Office, unless student has met with Dean of Students and communicated a future need for these funds.


-Scholarship funds are not issued in the form of checks or as a bank deposit.

- INTERVIEWS: It is suggested to dress professionally at interviews.
- TIMELINE: Applications and recommendations are reviewed <u>after</u> the stated deadline. All applicants will be mailed a scholarship decision letter within 4-5 weeks after the scholarship application deadline. <u>Updated 4/3/14</u>

MyFreeTaxes software which taxpayers with incomes below \$58,000 can use to prepare both federal and state returns free of charge. In 2013, the Internal Revenue Service partnered with MyFreeTaxes, a free online tax software program. MyFreeTaxes is powered by the Wal-Mart Foundation — in cooperation with United Way Worldwide, Goodwill Industries International, and National Disability Institute. In addition, there is an IRS- certified tax volunteer available via email, should taxpayers have questions. The software is a simple, interview-based program geared toward the basic wage earner who receives a W2. The customer answers the interview-based questions and it populates the tax return.



Facts on Women and Science, Technology, Engineering, Math

- The wage gap between women and men is much smaller in STEM occupations than other occupations. For computer programmers, women earn \$0.95 for every \$1 earned by men, compared to \$0.77 for all occupations.
- ♦ In the past 10 years, growth in STEM jobs has been three times greater than non-STEM Jobs.
- 80% of the fastest growing occupations in the United States depend upon mastery of mathematics and scientific knowledge and skills.
- While women comprise 48% of the US workforce, just 24% are in STEM fields, a statistic that has held constant for nearly the last decade.
- \$\times\$ 75% of all college students are women and students of color, they represent only 45% of STEM degrees earned each year.
- While Almost 30 percent of all male college freshmen planned to major in a STEM field in 2006 compared with only 15 percent of all female freshmen.
- ♦ Women with STEM jobs earned 33 percent more than comparable women in non- STEM jobs considerably higher than the STEM premium for men.
- Although women fill close to half of all jobs in the U.S. economy, they hold less than 25 percent of STEM jobs.²
- ♦ Between 2010 and 2020, STEM-related employment is projected to increase by 16.5% to over 8.5 million jobs. Yet, women still represent only 25% of the STEM workforce.³
- ♦ Women and minority groups represent about 70% of college students in the U.S., but receive only 45% of the undergrad degrees awarded in STEM fields of study.⁴
