Modules/Units

Module/Unit 1

Competencies:

OUTCOME CRITERIA: At the completion of this unit, the student will be able to:

- Define key terms in Maternal Newborn Nursing.
- Assess factors that affect maternal newborn health.

- Evaluate how society and culture can influence the health of women and children.
- Appraise barriers to healthcare among women, children and families.
- Debate legal/ethical issues that influence the practice of maternal infant and women's health nursing.
- Examine the key elements and major components of Family Centered Maternity Care (FCMC).
- Discuss current trends and issues in maternal, infant, and women's health care.
- Discuss the phases of the female reproductive cycle and describe how select hormones effect this cycle.
- Identify critical components of conception, embryonic development, and fetal development.
- Describe the development and function of accessory organs to maintain the pregnancy.
- Discuss the relevance of genetics within the context of caring for the childbearing family.
- Compare subjective, objective, and positive changes of pregnancy.
- Identify the anatomic and physiologic changes that occur during pregnancy.
- Summarize nutritional needs for the pregnant woman and her fetus.
- Characterize the emotional and physiological changes occurring with pregnancy.
- Summarize the essential components of a prenatal history, initial prenatal visit and subsequent prenatal visits.
- Outline appropriate nursing management to promote maternal self care and to minimize discomforts during pregnancy.

Module/Unit 2

Competencies:

- **OUTCOME CRITERIA:** At the completion of this unit, the student will be able to:
- Explain the term "high risk pregnancy" and common factors that place a pregnancy at risk.
- Recognize possible signs of prenatal complications in the pregnant client.
- Delineate the effects of selected gestational and pregestational conditions on pregnancy.

 Plan and provide care, including patient teaching, to the client experiencing complications of pregnancy.

Module/Unit 3

Competencies:

OUTCOME CRITERIA: At the completion of this unit, the student will be able to:

- Describe the four stages of labor and the related nursing and medical care.
- Examine the five critical factors (the 5 p's) that influence labor.
- Describe the mechanisms for spontaneous vaginal delivery and related nursing care.
- Discuss the nursing assessment and care of the intrapartum patient.
- 5. Compare the various methods of performing fetal and uterine assessments on the intrapartum patient. Include advantages and disadvantages of each.
- Identify normal and abnormal FHR patterns and correct nursing actions.
- Describe the primary causes for dystocia and the related nursing and medical care.
- Compare methods for inducing labor, explaining their advantages and disadvantages.
- Identify and manage high risk labor and delivery to promote healthy outcomes for the mother and infant.
- Describe key obstetrical emergencies and the related nursing and medical care.

Module/Unit 4

Competencies:

- **OUTCOME CRITERIA:** At the completion of this unit, the student will be able to:
- Describe the basic physiologic changes that occur in the postpartal period as a woman's body returns to it prepregnant state.
- Discuss the psychologic adjustments that normally occur during the postpartal period.

- Identify the critical elements of assessment and nursing care during the post partum period.
- Explain the physiology of breastfeeding and the appropriate patient teaching.
- Describe the critical elements of discharge teaching including contraception.
- Describe assessment of the postpartum woman for predisposing factors, onset, signs, and symptoms of various postpartum complications.
- Summarize the preventive measure for various complications of the postpartum period that should be incorporated into nursing care of the postpartum woman.
- List the causes of and appropriate nursing interventions for hemorrhage during the postpartal period.
- Develop a nursing care plan that reflects knowledge of etiology, pathophysiology, and current medical management for the woman experiencing postpartum hemorrhage, reproductive tract infection, urinary tract infection, mastitis, thromboembolic disease, or a postpartal psychiatric disorder.

Module/Unit 5

Competencies:

- **OUTCOME CRITERIA:** By completion of this unit, the student will be able to:
- Summarize the respiratory and cardiovascular changes that occur during the transition to extrauterine life and during stabilization.
- Summarize the components of a complete newborn assessment and the significance of normal variations and abnormal findings.
- Explain the various components of the gestational age assessment.
- Describe nursing care for neonates during the first week of life.
- Describe common laboratory and diagnostic tests for neonates.
- Describe topics and related content to be included in parent teaching on newborn and infant care.
- Describe the most common therapeutic and surgical procedures used for neonates and the related nursing care.
- Delineate the information to be included in discharge planning with the newborn's family.

- Compare the nutritional value and composition of breast milk and formula preparations.
- Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of breastfeeding and formula-feeding for both mother and newborn.
- Assess the newborn for symptoms of complications.
- Plan and provide care for the client who is experiencing newborn complications.
